VIII. Progress/status report

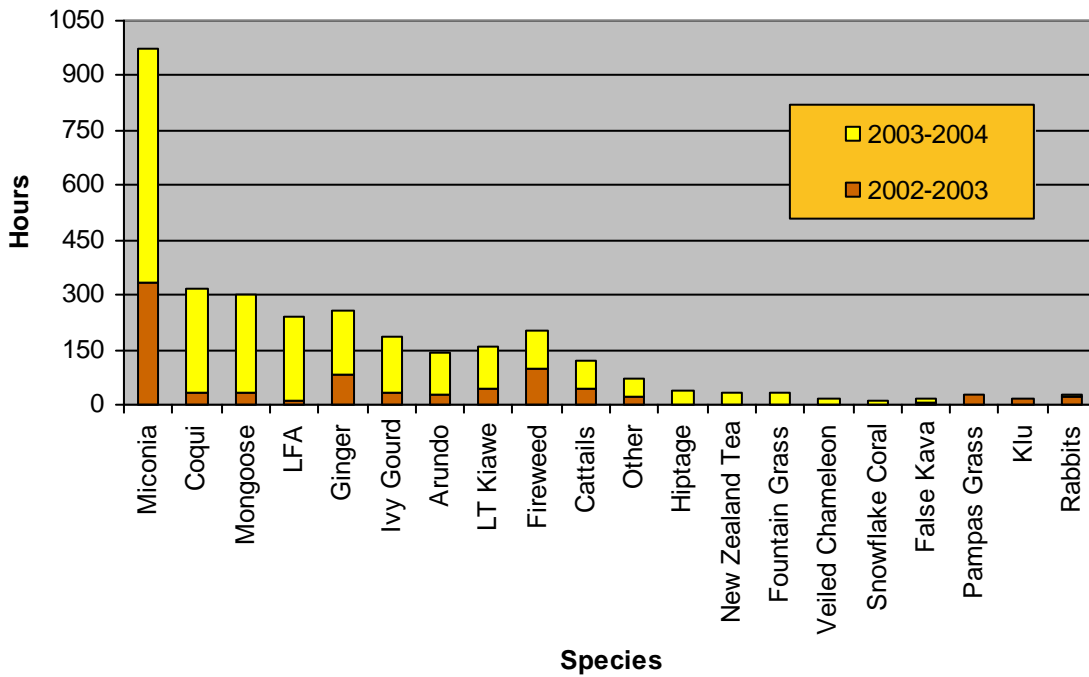
- Infrastructure
 - Budget: FY04 was \$190K, FY05 is \$456K
 - Staffing: At this point we have five staff members including one Americorp Intern. Positions that are still to be filled are the Data Manager, Field Crew Supervisor, Field Crew (2), and an Outreach Specialist.

- Facility: Office is at KCC and will need to vacate by the end of the year. Base yard: Shared space at HDOA is inadequate and does not allow us to implement full decontamination protocol. KISC is currently in the process of securing a new office / base yard facility.
- Vehicles: Nissan Frontier Crew Cab, Chevy 3500 Pickup for the Ant survey, Chevy 3500 Crew Cab, and another vehicle budgeted with the HISC funding.

- Rapid Response
 - Veiled Chameleon (one reported in Lawai in March)
 - Coqui Frogs (responding to radio PSA's)
 - Mongoose (ongoing response to sightings)
 - Miconia (only a few sightings, all negative)

- Surveys
 - Kahili Ginger Aerial Survey

- Hiptage (approx 500 acres)
- Mangrove (approx 250+ acres)
- Ground-truth of Fountain Grass Aerial Survey
- Little Fire Ants (island-wide)

IX. Update Target Species

- Add/drop target weeds/animals
 - **Miconia** – **Keep as #1 target.**
 - **LT Kiawe** – **Continue work.** Contact PMRF regarding efforts on their population.
 - **Fountain Grass** – **Keep as #2 priority.** Challenges: treatment method, publicity, expense, access.
 - **Fireweed** – **Continue monitoring.**
 - **Pampas Grass** – **Continue work.**
 - **Ivy Gourd** – **Continue work.** Push as education item. [MW: The bio-controls that were released on Oahu don't really wipe out the populations. Work needs to continue if it is still eradicatable.] [CK: HDOA does not actively work on IG because a bio control has been released here on Kauai.]
 - **False Kava** – **Continue work.**
 - **Cattails** – **Continue work.** Concentrating on Makaweli site. The NRCS EQUIP grant could help the taro farmers fund efforts.
 - **Arundo** – Continue work.
 - **Coqui Frogs** – **Continue with rapid response and eradication** of Lawai population.
 - **Little Fire ant** – **Continue eradication and survey work.**
 - **Banana Bunchy Top Virus** – **Add target to assist HDOA** with primarily surveys.
 - **Mongoose** – **Add as a priority species.** [MC: This is a WHIP qualifiable species.] [MW: We can fill in efforts on this with HISC funding.] [KG: I'd like to go after additional funding to fund a full time tech for this work. It is extremely labor intensive.]
 - ***Buddleia asiatica*** – [KC: This has been popping up in forest areas. It must be coming from an unknown seeding population.] [SN: It has also been found in the back of Waineha.] [JP: There are 3 species now on Kauai, do we know which species this is?] [TF: I would like to suggest that vouchers be made (2-3 specimens) of each plant found.] **This item will not be added to KISC's target list.** KRCP will map and treat as they find it.
 - ***Camelia sinensis*** - [JP: The plant has been spreading in Kokee a number of years. It has a white flower. There were only two original trees but 18 years of seeds have been establishing and are now spreading.] [KC: This plant responds well to Garlon. I am alarmed at how fast it is spreading.] [KC: It appears that it is capable of displacing other plants.] [AR: Is this species elevation sensitive?] [JO: This species has been at the Ag Station in Wailua since '61. CTAHR is pushing it as an industry.] **This item will not be added to KISC's target list.**

- **Rubber Vine** - This plant is a serious problem on Molokai where it escaped from a garden. **This will be added as a survey item.** KISC will treat where found.
- **Kudzu – Collect specimens and ID the species.**
- **Mules foot fern – Add item to map and treat when found.** KISC should push this item to be added to the Noxious Weed List so that Nurseries can no longer sell it.
- ***Cissus verticulata* – Research information** about this species. [TF: This vine is related to the grape and there are three species. **Map and monitor.**
- **Bush beard grass** – This item is beyond control. **This item will not be added to KISC's target list.**
- **Hiptage – Leave on list to continue monitoring.** Encourage landowners to control. Provide them with information on control methods and the extent of the population.
- **Kahili Ginger - Remove from target list.** Increase capacity with other agencies.
- **Mangrove – Remove from target list.** There is over 250 acres of this. It is hard to control and is not incipient.
- **Australian Tree Fern – Keep this as an educational item.**
- **Greenhouse frog** – Table for next meeting.
